IRP "Book in a Bag" Instructions

1.) Purpose: Get readers excited about a book, author, series, or genre.

A "Book in a Bag" is a book report contained in a brown paper or paper gift bag (any size). The inside of your bag should include items that you will be able to use to explain important parts of your book. The outside of the bag will be embellished with the following information:

2.) The front of the bag should include:

Title of the Book

Author of the Book

Hand-drawn illustration of a favorite scene from the book (like a book cover)

- 3.) On the <u>back</u> of the bag, neatly write (or type) a one-paragraph summary of the bgok. (The summary should be 7-10 sentences long.)
- 4.) Also on the back, summarize the theme, or message, of the book. (1-2 sentences)
- 5.) On the <u>side</u> of the bag, describe the main character and the primary conflict he/she faces in the book. (3-5 sentences)
- 6.) On the <u>other side</u> of the bag, state your opinion of the book. (Would you recommend it to others? Why or why not?) Then support your opinion with at least three details. (3-5 sentences)
- 7.) Collect 5 physical objects that are relevant to the plot of the story (that will fit into your bag) to help you explain the book when you give your presentation in class.

The oral presentation will include:

- · Your summary of the book
- · An explanation of why you selected the objects in the bag and how they connect to the book
- · Your opinion/recommendation of the book

Remember to

- Look at everyone.
- Speak clearly.
- Show your enthusiasm.
- Keep it short!
